RARE PLANT SALE - May 2, 1987

It would be impossible in our limited space to describe all the interesting plants we will have on May 2 for our Rare Plant Sale. Perhaps some of the ones below will interest you.

Halesia carolina - (Carolina Silverbell) This is a very interesting slow growing tree. It is covered with many white bell shaped flowers in May and fascinating large straw colored seed pods in the fall. You can see a mature specimen at the upper entrance to the arboretum (across from the road to the meeting house).

Viburnum Juddii - This is a hybrid of Carlesii (Koreanspice). It has excellent foliage and lovely pinkish flowers which give off a delightful fragrance.

<u>Viburnum acerifolium</u> - (Mapleleaf Viburnum) The foliage on this shrub turns to reddish purple in the fall. It is extremely shade tolerant and usually used for naturalizing.

Clethra alnifolia - (Summersweet) These very desirable medium growing shrubs have a lovely spicy fragrance in bloom. It will be available in either its white or pink (rosea) flowered form.

Chionanthus virginicus - (White Fringetree, Old-man's beard) This slow growing small tree or large shrub produces in May-June many tassel-like white flowers which have a pleasing scent. Later it has blue-black fruits which are relished by birds.

Spirea japonica alpina - (Daphne spirea) This dainty dwarf shrub has rose pink flowers in summer. It should not grow above 2 1/2 feet (in 15 years) and is excellent for rock garden use or as a ground cover.

<u>Hibiscus syriacus Diana</u> - (Rose-of-Sharon) This shrub is available for the first time this year due to several requests. The cultivar 'Diana' is a new triploid hybrid which bears huge pure white flowers all summer long.

Oxydendrum arboreum - (Sourwood) This slow-growing small tree (to 15' in 15 years) produces many small flowers on 4-10" panicles which literally smother the foliage in summer. The leaves turn brilliant colors in the fall.

Franklinia alatamaha - (Franklin Tree) This is a small tree with large (3" across) white cup-shaped flowers which appear in August and September. The glossy green foliage changes to orange or red in fall.

Crataegus phaenopyrum - (Washington Hawthorn) This small tree (30')grows into a rounded dense thorny tree which has cluster of white flowers in June and bright red fruit in the fall.

Cladrastis lutea - (American yellowwood) This beautiful flowering tree (30-50') produces long (8-14") panicles in spring. It's bright yellowish green foliage in spring contrasts with the darker green of more common shade trees, but its fall color is rarely spectacular.

Euonymus europaeus - (Spindle Tree) This is a small fast-growing tree (12-30') which are valued primarily for their bright pink fruit in the fall. It does not make a good specimen tree but the spectacular fall display makes it excellent for a background tree.

In addition to the items described, we are trying an experiment this year and have ordered a number of very small plants. If these are not large enough to be offered at the rare plant sale, they will be grown for a few years until they are of respectable size. We hope, however, that many of them will be available this year. We also should have some small unusual trees and of course, the dwarf conifers described in the last newsletter. Be sure to mark May 2 on your calendar.

# Clematis

Most of our readers know what delightful flowers are produced on the Betty Corning Clematis - beautiful blue bell-shaped flowers which bloom in profusion on the established vine. We are offering, also by pre-order, two others this year - Dutchess of Albany and Tangutica. Dutchess of Albany (Clematis texensis) is described as having lily shaped blooms of deep pink with a red band on each petal and creamy white stamens. They are about 1 to 2 inches in size and appear from July through October. Clematis tangutica (Golden clematis) are like glowing yellow lanterns with brown stamens. They are sometimes called Russia Virgin's Bower. They grow vigorously, sometimes to 20 feet and bloom from July to October. Their thick petals last well in bouquets. Each of these Clematis cost \$12.50 and must be pre-ordered but picked up on May 2. To reserve any of these plants from our very limited supply, call Margaret Law at 463-5256.
